People experincing hor elessness are among the most vulnerable groups, often presenting with comp. x medical ard psychological needs requiring structured care. According to the Housing and divbaring evelopment (HUD), someone is deemed homeless if they lack stable, pernetically an dequate overnight shelter. With over 500,000 homeless individuals in the US, 35% of a hom lack shelter or reside in inadequate locations (Kurata et al., 2020), providing coordinates care becomes challenging due to resource constraints, limited healthcare access, and associated stigma.

Government Policies Impacting Care Coordination

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Government policies significantly influence care coordination for homeless individuals. The Affordable Care Act (ACA) of 2010 aimed to improve healthcare access for all Americans. While primarily focusing on health insurance reform and Medicaid expansion, the ACA indirectly affected laws concerning homeless shelters. It introduced Health Home programs, particularly beneficial for homeless individuals with serious health issues (Dickins et al., 2020). Additionally, the ACA established the "Homeless Health Care (HCH)" program, promoting case management and care coordination, ensuring collaboration among healthcare professionals and social service organizations (Lanese et al., 2021).

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) of 1996 emphasize: proceeding the privacy and confidentiality of individual health information. Homeless individuals care unique health issues classified as sensitive under HIPAA, requiring additional measures to safeguard privacy and prevent stigmatization (Tønnessen et al.).

Certain policies can lead to ethical dilemmas in homeless healthcare. For example, the Documentation Requirement Policy under HIPAA, which mandates sider by and citizenship documents for complete healthcare access, poses a mora conflict as a calless individuals may struggle to provide such documentation (Tønnessen et al.)

Policies Presenting Ethical Dilemmas for Care Conchation

Another policy, the ACA, creates a moral diem, and withholding Medicaid expansion in many states, resulting in a coverage gap for low-income roups, including homeless individuals. This denies access to insurance and Medicaid solvices, particularly for those without permanent home addresses (Adashi et al.).

The Nursing Code of Ethics ser. as a findamental ethical framework for care coordination, emphasizing the protection or patients' rights, health, and safety, especially crucial when dealing with vulnerable populations. Aurses play a vital role in addressing healthcare disparities based on social determinants are ensuring justice and fair treatment for homeless individuals (Chang, 2019). Adhering to excical principles enables nurses to provide patient-centered care, respecting autonomy, willness, and safety (Hanks et al., 2019).
